

# A Message from the Rev. Blake Hutson



Dear Apostles,

The fall season is in full swing and so are our ministries at Holy Apostles. I am excited about the plans, worship services, and ministry opportunities that we will have this year. I believe the church is called to minister to those around us and serve the larger community in which we reside. I'm especially proud of two new ministries at Holy Apostles.

First, we are expanding our relationship with Trace Crossings Elementary School. We have received a grant from the Diocese of Alabama to kick off a weekend backpack food program. For several years local churches have partnered with Hoover schools to make sure that children in need have food over the weekend. Food is purchased through the Community Food Bank and

volunteers from HA will deliver the food to the school. On Fridays, teachers will discreetly distribute food to at-risk students in their backpacks. For more information, contact Dee Nance at dtnance23@gmail.com.

Second, Holy Apostles has supported Habitat for Humanity for many years with Advent and Lenten 'builds' which will continue. This fall, there is an additional special event. Episcopal Churches in the Diocese of Alabama are partnering with Greater Birmingham Habitat for Humanity in an 'All Episcopal Build.' For eight weeks, nearly a dozen Episcopal Churches are pooling resources, materials, and volunteers to make a home a reality. The build date for Holy Apostles is Saturday, September 26th from 7:30AM to 4:30PM. In addition to volunteering, there are other ways to support this ministry such as making lunches for our group or donating supplies. #### Lifestyle changes and the Doctrine of Sanctification

Recently I read The Mayo Clinic Diet. This book, like many others, emphasizes that eating healthy is a "lifestyle change," not a quick-fix "diet" which tends not to be a long-term fix in the end. This made me think that being a Christian is likewise more of a lifestyle change, as opposed to a quick fix for the trials and tribulations we may encounter here on Earth. So what does this mean for the average Christian, living in a world of donuts and cake?! Over the next several weeks in September, we will continue reading the Letter of James, both on Sundays at worship and as part of the Daily Office. James is famous for his line "faith without works is dead (James 2:21)(NRSV)." He also says, "be doers of the word, not just hearers (James 1:22)." On the other hand, in adult formation class we talked about Salvation, particularly Paul's letter to the Ephesians, where Paul writes, "by grace you have been saved, not by works (Ephesians 2:8-9)."

So some of you are saying, "Alright Preacher, which is it?" My answer is "both!" Yes, Paul definitely emphasized the Doctrine of Grace, but he also had a lot to say about spiritual gifts that flow from our faith, and about living as a new creation through the power of the Holy Spirit who dwells within us. I therefore tend to look at the situation in two ways. First, we are Justified/Saved through our faith in Jesus Christ, who lived, died and rose again in order to save us from our sins and bring us to eternal life. We can live in the knowledge that "it is finished." On the other hand, I also adhere to the Doctrine of Sanctification, which means that as a Christian, we live into that knowledge that our salvation is secure. We come to truly realize that the Holy Spirit is working within each of us as we live here on Earth, drawing us closer to God, (and dare I say it) bringing us closer to Holiness. Our "works" then flow from our "faith". We become doers of the word engaging in a lively faith. This sanctification part is a journey that will continue throughout our lives, sometimes two steps forward and three steps back, certainly never perfect this side of heaven.

Sanctification is not just a Sunday thing, nor a lesson learned in one day, or something we can accomplish with a project once in awhile. Rather, it is a manner of life. It's a lifestyle change — learning new habits and putting away some old ones. Our works—prayer, worship on Sundays, caring for others, living into our gifts and virtues—hopefully will strengthen our relationship with God, which in turn will strengthen our love and care for one another. Sure, I may eat an occasional donut (WAY off my healthy lifestyle path), but hopefully, I will grow spiritually (and health-wise) as I journey home to God.

Let's explore together what it means to live a life of faith! — Robin

HALO is an acronym—Holy Apostles Lunch Out—and an opportunity for us to use our God-given talents and abundant blessings to serve those in our community. From *The Book of Common Prayer*: "we remember the poor and neglected, the homeless and the destitute and all who have none to care for them."

The third Sunday of each month is designated for Holy Apostles' volunteers to meet at the Parish Hall at Grace Episcopal Church in Woodlawn to prepare lunch for 60-80 hungry people. We gladly make sandwiches and chips; or ground beef with noodles; or spaghetti and a salad; along with cookies, a cool glass of lemonade, and a banana! By the way, we are known as 'The Banana Church'!

Before opening the doors to welcome our guests, we say a prayer of thanksgiving and a blessing for those we will serve. I promise—you will be blessed!

# Weekenders Backpack program: The newest addition to the TCES Ministry

Holy Apostles has partnered with Trace Crossings Elementary School in the past, so this year we are expanding this ministry in our backyard.

With the encouragement from Greg Bishop of Hoover Helps, who partners schools with churches and other groups, HA will provide Weekender backpacks to students that have been identified as needing food over the weekends. The program provides a bag of nutritious, staple foods for the children.

Holy Apostles will provide manpower to pick up the already prepared bags from the food bank and drop them off at TCES once or twice a month. The teachers will discreetly add the bag of food to the child's backpack on Fridays. This will occur every week for the 40-week program.

The cost of the program is \$180.00 per student for the 40 weeks. Thanks to a \$2,000.00 grant from the Diocese, HA has the start-up funding. However, this will not sustain the program through the end of this school year. We currently have 52 students identified in need, with the potential of increasing students.

Additional ministries that HA offers to TCES are school supplies and gifts from St. Nicholas for Christmas.


The school year 2015-16 started with generous gifts from our parish. We provided full backpacks to six students and a wide variety of supplies to stock TCES. Teachers were able to share our donations with students that arrived in the first days of school without any supplies. "It enabled the student(s) to feel a part of the school," said teachers and Counselor Angie Smith.

The Feast Day of St. Nicholas, the saint who inspired the legend of Santa Claus, is observed by providing shoes in a gift bag filled with small gifts ranging from sweets to gift cards for food to a small toy or T-shirt. We expect to provide sneakers or tennis shoes to 50-75 kids.

# Denim & Diamonds Annual Auction set for Oct. 17

Not only is this one of the most fun events of the year, but also the proceeds support the mission of Holy Apostles.

"The fall auction has become a major way to sustain the 'in-reach' ministries of Holy Apostles as well as enabling the various outreach efforts," said The Rev. Blake Hutson, Holy Apostles Rector.

The ministries include Apostles with Fire, Holy Apostles' Lunch Outreach (HALO), Kairos Prison Ministry, Bridge Ministries Food Pantry, Episcopal Place, Trace Crossings Elementary School and Habitat for Humanity. "In fact," Rev. Hutson said, "I think the auction itself is an outreach ministry of the church, taking the message of Holy Apostles to the entire community."

Besides the usual activities of the Auction Committee, this year includes the new Ministry Challenge. "We are asking each of the ministries at Holy Apostles to put together a collection of items that reflects that ministry," Bunn said. "For example, those active in Habitat for Humanity might put together a collection of tools, or members of HALO could put together a gift basket that contains cooking utensils or supplies. If the ministry has only a small membership, it could join another ministry to collect items. Other ministries might donate a single (very awesome) item that signifies the core purpose of the ministry."

Bunn also stressed the need for all parish members to donate or solicit major big-ticket items such as vacation condo packages, hunting, fishing or golf outings, theater tickets and handcrafted furniture.

"There are many ways members of Holy Apostles can help make the auction a success," said co-chair Mike Lewallen. Lewallen said parish members; their family, friends and colleagues can support the auction in one or more of the following ways:

- Donate a product or service, an item from your business or organize an event such as a themed dinner party to be auctioned off.
- Solicit donations from friends and family members, from places of business (especially from retailers you frequent).
- Be an auction sponsor. If can't attend or are not comfortable soliciting items, make a donation toward the expenses and proceeds of the auction.



Auction tickets will be on sale each Sunday starting Sept. 6th after the 8:45 and 10:30 services, or though Ticket Chair Jenny Blair (205-403-0991). Individual tickets are \$30 and a table of eight is \$225. The price of each

ticket includes admission to the auction, food and soft drinks. New this year will be "small plates" prepared by Chef Jim Bunn. Attendees will enjoy various food stations throughout the venue topped off with coffee and homemade specialty desserts. Last year was a sellout, so buy your tickets early! For those who would like beer or wine with dinner, the event is BYOB.

"Everything is well underway," Bunn said. "But we need the help of the entire Holy Apostles' family to make sure the auction is a great success."

Auction items can be dropped off at the church on Sundays now through Sunday, October 11th. Just look for an Auction Committee member to take your items. For the Auction Committee to do its work and make this event a great success, these deadlines must be honored. 
