## A Message from the Rev. Blake Hutson



Dear Apostles,

As we enter the month of April, we enter one of the most important times of the year. We are approaching Holy Week, the week in which we celebrate the essence and the heart of our faith. Good Friday and Easter Sunday are the most important days/events of the Church year. As we approach these most important days it is important that we hold these days together.

Good Friday and Easter Sunday must be held together because they are equally important. They reveal the drama of God triumphing over our sins through God's sacrificial love. Holding these days' together means not passing through Holy

Week too quickly. We sometimes have a tendency to focus on Easter and forget Good Friday. We must remember that Jesus did not get to Easter Sunday without first going through Good Friday. Before we get to Easter we must remember what happened on Good Friday and consider what this day teaches us.

On Good Friday Jesus suffers a miserable death on a Roman cross. He endured shame, betrayal, and torture (Lk. 22:47-23:56). We must remember this scene because our sins brought on this betrayal, beating and execution. Yet this day reveals the depth of God's love. Jesus' love for us enabled Him to endure it. Jesus' love allowed Him to be crucified.

Good Friday reveals something else: Jesus knows pain. Specifically, He knows our pain. We find comfort in Good Friday because we know that we worship a Lord who identifies with our pain and suffering. In our world, we know violence, feelings of marginalization and rejection. Good Friday shows us that God knows these things and has experienced them too! In his book Resurrection, Rowan Williams, the former Archbishop of Canterbury writes, "We experience ourselves as sufferers, as victims, and so experience Christ's cross as the symbol of who and what we are. Jesus as victim is the image of myself as victim. God, making himself a victim in the death of Jesus, affirms me in my suffering: he is [...] the 'fellow sufferer who understands'" (69-70).

Good Friday doesn't have the last word...Good Friday isn't the end of the story. Easter Sunday reveals that Jesus was more than an ordinary human being and certainly more than a religious martyr. Jesus' Resurrection reveals not only God's power, but also God's triumphant and victorious love. Easter Sunday reveals that Christ was, and is greater than the death that we face. The women came to the tomb and were told by the angel "You seek Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified...he is not here. He is risen!" (Mk. 16:6, Mt. 28:5-6) The empty tomb reveals Jesus' strength and power in the face of death. The empty tomb reveals that there is no greater power in heaven or on earth than the power of God.

We must hold both days, Easter Sunday and Good Friday, together and celebrate them both. They both reveal different aspects of the triumph and power of God's love. Our sin is serious business, so is death and human suffering. Yet, these forces which seem so powerful are not absolute. Easter Sunday declares that by God's power they have been overcome. Christ was raised to new life. This is our hope! Through God's power and love, this is our expectation and God's promise to us. Good Friday and Easter Sunday show us that the ultimate, most significant power that we will face in this life and the next is the Powerful, Triumphant love of God!

## Holy Apostles' Deacon appointed Archdeacon for the Diocese




At the recent Diocesan convention, Bishop Kee Sloan appointed The Reverend Marti Holmes as Archdeacon for the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama.

Deacon Marti's job description as The Venerable Marti Holmes is primarily to shepherd the Deacon Community. There are administrative responsibilities for some reporting and recordkeeping. The particular, specific and demanding servant role of the deacon is to interpret the needs, concerns and hopes of the world to the church, to serve in assisting the priests and bishops in worship, and to care for the poor, the sick and the friendless as a vocational call, requires that deacons maintain a healthy spiritual life. Therefore, the Archdeacon's primary responsibility is to provide opportunities for the Deacon Community to gather for spiritual growth, encouragement, continuing education, communication, mutual support, and worship. The Archdeacon is a member of the Bishop's staff, while maintaining the commitment to fully serve the parish community where assigned.

Deacon Marti stated, "I am humbled that Bishop Sloan made this appointment, and hopeful that God will provide every-

thing necessary for me to accomplish His purpose. Holy Apostles is a fruitful parish, and this appointment provides recognition to the parish family as supporting their clergy and the mission of God." The Ven. Marti Holmes prefers that her Holy Apostles family call her Deacon Marti, or just Marti!



### I Will Bless You and You Will Be a Blessing

At the 2015 Diocesan Convention, the Diocese of Alabama announced guidelines for the Blessing of Same Sex Relationships. The Diocese has invited the Vestry of each parish to read, study and pray about whether blessings will be performed in individual parishes. As a part of the discernment process, vestries across Alabama are reading and studying a book published by the Episcopal Church: *I Will Bless You and You Will Be a Blessing*. The Vestry of Holy Apostles invites parishioners to read this book and to offer feedback as the Vestry enters into a discernment period. # **Bishop Marray Gives Thanks for UTO Grant**



Recently, the Rt. Reverend Santosh Marray, Assistant Bishop of Alabama, visited with the ladies of Holy Apostles and shared his experience of receiving a grant from the United Thank Offering (UTO).

"When I was selected to be Bishop...a miracle of God, He called me from Jacksonville, Florida to be bishop of the Seychelles off the eastern coast of Africa, a two-hour flight from Kenya." Bishop Marray learned from another bishop in nearby Madagascar about a United Thank Offering grant he had received, and the bishop informed him that this was "The Seychelles' year to apply!" Bishop Marray signed off on his application just two days before the deadline. His application proposed to "transform a dilapidated building into a training center." On a visit to the States to see family, he had an opportunity to see the Coordinator of UTO and gave an overview of his project.



Just two weeks later, he was awarded the funds for his project. "I screamed hallelujah so loud! I had prayed so much for the grant—did what I was supposed to do, but without the grant, I couldn't have done it!"

"Your pennies in that blue box—it's amazing how many people are affected by your coins; just collect it...if you have the discipline, it's amazing how many lives are transformed and souls

saved because of the little blue box—UTO has a profound impact all over the world." Bishop Marray was able to complete a laundry list of projects planned for five years in four years in the Seychelles, then returned to the States and eventually became Assistant Bishop to Bishop Kee Sloan.

Bishop Marray spoke about the Episcopal Church's emphasis on mission (outreach) in the world. He said "mission is a broad term; outreach is just one complement of the mission of God." He sees the United Thank Offering as an "unselfish demonstration of our love for God" that allows the Church to respond to the needs of others nationally, regionally, and globally. "Christians, rich or poor, can give unselfishly to causes that are beyond us by inserting coins in a little blue box every day—imagine a million of us doing this every day, thanking God for the little things that make us feel happy and grateful!"

## **Scholarships Available to Graduating Seniors**

Graduating seniors are eligible for scholarships through the ECW of the Diocese of Alabama. Go to the alabamaecw.org website and click on "ministries".

#### **Application Information**

All college scholarships are based on need (40%), church involvement and activities (40%), and merit (20%). Applicants should be able to document information regarding their family's financial status (Form 1040). An application for a college scholarship may be made every year a student is in college; however, an award to any one person is limited to a maximum of two years. Granted funds are mailed directly to the registrar's office of the college of the recipient's choice. Seminarians are helped with CPC funds and are ineligible for ECW college scholarships.

#### Eligibility Requirements and Application Process

Each applicant must submit a completed Application Packet by April 30, 2013 and be:

A communicant in good standing with the Episcopal Church, Diocese of Alabama

Accepted or enrolled in an academic institution of college rank

Pursuing professional certification or a degree from an accredited institution

Able to show financial need

A recipient of no more than one previous ECW Scholarship

## Application Packets must be complete, and must arrive by April 30th;

#### Application Packet must include:

- (1) Completed Application Form;
- (2) Recent transcript;
- (3) A one or two-page essay summarizing your need, your school and community accomplishments, and your church activities and;
- (4) The Church Involvement Form, completed by your priest, and
- (5) Your most recent Federal Tax Return;
- (6) Passport size photograph. Instructions for completing the package are included on the Application Form.

Applications must be postmarked or received electronically by April 30 of the year of application. If applying for a second scholarship, an evaluation by college chaplain is acceptable.

Nouwen's meditations on Rembrandt's 'Prodigal Son'

## "In the joy of the return, we forget about the leaving..."



The traditional parable for the third Sunday in Lent is *The Return of the Prodigal Son*. This Lenten season at Holy Apostles, Deacon Marti Holmes is leading a class on *The Return of the Prodigal Son* by Henri J. M. Nouwen.

Henri Nouwen was a renowned Dutch priest, author, and professor who wrote 40 books on the spiritual life. His literary legacy lives on in over two million books sold worldwide, in 22 languages. Nouwen was so inspired by Rembrandt Van Rijn's painting that he explored the Gospel's parable—the themes of homecoming, sibling relationship, and the father's compassion in one of his last works before his death in 1996.

While it is good to understand Nouwen's point of view, it's also good to understand Rembrandt's life—for he lived in an age of religious belief. His mother was Catholic, his father Dutch Reformed Church. However, it is unknown if Rembrandt belonged to any formal religious community. He lived entirely in the 17th century, a time often described as the Dutch Golden Age. He served an important apprenticeship with Peter Lastman in Amsterdam; worked at The Hague, and as a portraitist. Another important teacher taught him about the power of light on the

pigments he used. It was this skill that entranced Henri Nouwen when he viewed The Return of the Prodigal Son at the Hermitage in St. Petersburg in 1986. Nouwen spent hours studying the 8' high by 6' wide painting over a two day period—with the changing light revealing the characters in the work--a father, younger son, and the elder son, with several figures in the background. Rembrandt was recognized by his contemporaries as a master painter of biblical stories. Rembrandt himself wrote of what he sought to achieve in his art: "melding the earthly and spiritual as has no other painter in Western art." (rembrandtonline.org)

All of us are thankful to Andy for his service and wish God's blessings on him and his family as well as a safe return! Godspeed, Andy!




