Your change for blessings changes lives!

Early legend surrounds the United Offering as it was known in 1889. The first ingathering amounted to only \$87. The ladies of the Episcopal churches thought if women knew where their money was going, the donations might be greater. They were correct--the United Offering became the United Thank Offering (UTO) in the year 1919 and the triennium offering totaled \$1,371,537. Early donations were evenly divided between domestic and overseas projects.

The Mission of the United Thank Offering is to invite people to offer daily prayers of thanksgiving to God by placing a few coins in blue boxes or "mite boxes" as an outward sign of those prayers that benefit others at home and abroad. The mission is entrusted to the women of the church—Episcopal Church Women (ECW). Through a system of granting, our small change builds schools, hospitals, church buildings, and helps finance education all over the USA and the world.

The ECW, barely a year in existence at Holy Apostles, initiated the program during Lent—as a discipline of thanks by both adults and children. One week after Easter saw the ingathering of mite boxes at 'the Old Rugged Cross,' built and designed by Jim Mersmann for the ECW. A check was sent to our local Diocese in the amount of \$359.03 (along with several Canadian coins and a two-cent Euro!) The ECW thanks all parishioners for their thoughtful and generous gifts!

We feed anywhere from 50-75 people with sometimes as many as 20 children included in those numbers. We generally begin preparing the meal around 10:30 which includes a main portion (usually spaghetti, chicken and noodles, or chili during the winter months) along with a salad, vegetable, a piece of fruit, and then a roll with water and sweet tea. We prepare the plates and hand them out from 12:00 to 1:30, then clean the kitchen and the parish hall where the folks eat their lunch."


Book Review

Presidents, politics, and religion: subject of Faiths of the Founding Fathers

Faiths of the Founding Fathers provided the framework for Fr. Blake's Adult Formation class this past month. Most of us learn about our nation's birth without any personal details about the Founding Fathers. This succinct text by David L. Holmes (2006: Oxford University Press) traces the early religions in the American Colonies geographically; discusses the Evangelical Movements; details a belief born of The Enlightenment (Deism); then personalizes the religious views of six of the Founding Fathers. In addition, three Orthodox Christian founders' beliefs are described and a "Layperson's Guide" to distinguishing Deism from Orthodoxy is provided.

The Epilogue chapter discusses the most recent evangelical movement and its partisan nature in terms of presidential politics ranging from Episcopalian Gerald Ford to Southern Baptist Jimmy Carter to Presbyterian Ronald Reagan to the "throwback to the era of the founding fathers"—George H.W. Bush #41 (Episcopalian) to the 'mixed' religions of the Clintons to the Religious Right-ism of George Bush #43.

Perhaps the most profound statement from the author is in his closing: "Americans are concerned that their presidents be sincere men and women of faith. These founding men and women were often sincere believers." However, he states, their faith was different from that held by Americans of later generations and that we should tell our history, "warts and all. To do otherwise is to be untrue not only to history but also to the founders themselves. 'The past is a foreign country,' " Holmes quotes a 20th century writer of the 18th century religious beliefs. "They do things differently there."

Website has new interactive capability

The Holy Apostles Communications Team is always working to improve how we get the word out about the church to both you and the Hoover community. Our Website has proven to be an important tool in doing so; many new members have come in to us, telling us that the site (http://www.holyapostleshoover.org) was their first point of contact with Holy Apostles.

After discussion with Father Blake, we have made some changes to the layout of the site to improve clarity, relevance in Google and other searches, and usability. Perhaps most important is the use of interactive forms in two places, for general contacts and for prayer requests. Visitors can now send a message directly to the Church Office without needing to do it as an e-mail from a separate program; just fill in the boxes and click Submit or Send. The prayer request works the same way, and is passed confidentially to the correct people, such as the Daughters of the King.

You may find some pages have disappeared or moved. If you have lost a favorite location, contact Bruce Klaiss (klaiss@gmail.com), and he'll help you find what you're looking for, or explain why it has disappeared.

Facebook stats show HA's reach

Each week, Facebook Administrator Rod Scott and two comanagers of the page receive statistics on the Holy Apostles page. Recently, Rod selected the highest rated posts for the last several months through Easter.

'Recently at Holy Apostles' photo album reached 100 people; 'At Holy Apostles' (March 5) 112 people; Men's Group post without a photo was viewed by 113 people while Girls' Night Out with photo album reached 118 people. The Holy Week schedule with photos (April 12) was viewed by 156 people and the Easter Sunrise service photos reached 384 people. Crawfish Boil notices of April 6th, 9th, and 21st reached over 1,500; 162 and 384 persons, respectively.

The Communications Team found the results exciting. Fr. Blake added, "Facebook is a tool we use for both evangelism and communication. We need to be aware of these numbers and how we are reaching our parish community—and beyond." Rod plans to monitor Facebook stats quarterly.



Update: Follow @ApostlesHoover on Twitter

Holy Apostles is increasing its focus on using Social Media. In an effort to reach individuals who aren't on Facebook, we joined Twitter as well last Fall. "To date," says Lane Oden, Twitter manager, "tweets came from the EYC and Gumbo Gala teams, but I've linked the Facebook page to Twitter so anything I tweet will automatically post to Facebook as well..." FAQ from Lane Oden:

1. What is posted on Twitter?

Our Communications Ministry posts occasional updates (known as Tweets) to Twitter. Tweets may include a photo from coffee hour or of a guest speaker for Adult Education. It may include recent news regarding the parish and upcoming events. Occasionally, we may also share uplifting Tweets from various other sources we follow locally, nationally, and globally.

2. Do I need to have a Twitter account to see @ApostlesHoover Tweets?

No. Unlike Facebook, you can still view our Tweets without signing up to use Twitter. Just visit, http:// www.twitter.com/ApostlesHoover. To receive our Tweets automatically, you will need to sign up for a free Twitter account and then Follow us from that link.

3. If I'm already a Fan on Facebook, do I still need to Follow @ApostlesHoover on Twitter? That's up to you. Currently, we manage the two social media outlets separately, so the content can vary. We have integrated the two.
