A Message from the Rev. Blake Hutson



Dear Apostles,

A little more than a week ago we had our annual Vacation Bible School at Holy Apostles. Our volunteers worked hard organizing this ministry--teachers taught classes, teenagers served as helpers; children had fun singing, learning, playing and making crafts. The outside activities were messy and the kids enjoyed their morning snack. Regardless of your age or ability, everyone has fun at VBS.

Every year, during this week, the atmosphere in the church feels different—you can feel the energy from the children; there's something special about teenagers and adult volunteers coming

together to serve our youngest apostles.

Children are fun to watch. The way they see the world and approach life is so different from adults. Children have such energy, such enthusiasm, and playfulness. Their innocence is refreshing. It's amazing how much children watch adults. They listen to what we say, and overhear our conversations; they learn from us even when we think we aren't teaching them anything.

Watching them last week, I was reminded not only do they learn from us; but we can also learn from them. In Matthew 19 people brought little children to Jesus for him to bless them and pray for them. But the disciples rebuked them. But Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matthew 19:14).

Children are open to new ideas; they are moldable and teachable. The older we get, we tend to lose these qualities. You've heard the old saying: 'You can't teach an old dog new tricks.' But I think God always wants us to be learning and growing; open to the Spirit's work in our lives and in the Church. When it comes to faith, rather than 'an old dog' God wants us to be more like a young puppy: curious, playful, full of spirit and enthusiasm.

Also, children learn by example. They do what they see adults do: they watch parents, teachers and family members and imitate our actions and our language. As God's children, we are to imitate our heavenly Father; watch and listen to the words of Jesus and do what he did—serve others, speak words of healing and love, welcome the stranger and offer forgiveness. Being with our children during VBS was a great joy. The presence of these children reminds us that our parish is thriving, healthy and our future is bright. We've been learning, growing and playing together. By God's grace, we've seen a glimpse of the Kingdom this week.

State of the Parish

This is such a wonderful time of the year! Nature and the outdoors are always beautiful in their own way, but right now, colors are brilliant and extra glorious. That's much like Holy Apostles. We've always been a wonderful place, but now, it seems we are extra blessed. There are so many good things going on – you can feel it in the air!

In our survey and summary from late 2015/early 2016, you as a parish let the Vestry know you want to know what's going on—so, this is a State of the Parish update!

Many great ministries and activities are ongoing. More adult formation and education was something you've requested and we increased it by extending a mid-week Bible study through Epiphany, and our Lenten Sunday and mid-week classes. For 2016-2017, Fr. Blake restructured the Associate Clergy position to organize and oversee Christian Education for all ages. Outreach ministries have increased with our ongoing support of the backpack food program for children at Trace Crossings Elementary School, Bethany Village at Camp McDowell, and Bridge Ministries. We are so excited with our growing community involvement with events such as Stop Hunger Now and Celebrate Hoover Day; hosting community events, (such as a recent a piano recital and Odyssey pre-school graduation) and Diocesan events like hosting the Diocese of AL Youth Cohort Training, and the Gumbo Gala to name a few. More people know about our "little church on the hill."

A growing and invigorated church requires support not only in a spiritual manner, but staffing as well. We would like to highlight some changes. Holy Apostles was blessed with a wonderful administrator for quite some time. At her request, we took bookkeeping off her back. This set up our new structure with an official bookkeeper who works ten hours a week and an office manager working 24 hours a week. We are blessed with two wonderful folks at a total cost less than before. Please feel free to introduce yourselves to Kim McAdams and Suzane Churchman if you've not met them. We have also been blessed in our partnership with the Diocese of AL by having Associate Clergy Robin Hinkle with us. What a gift! This specified length of time agreement has provided us with an additional clergy person while there isn't budget for one.

In continuing personnel coverage, we are so very excited to have our new Director of Music, Derek Kluz. Yes, it took a bit to get to this point — we acknowledge that! However, we were able to bring Derek on board. Right person at the right time! He brings such wonderful musical knowledge and fine performance along with working beautifully with our children. We talk about the Apostles with Fire—but our Holy Apostles Choir is on fire! We continue to have our EYC leader Julia Sanford and our two paid nursery workers. And, what can we say about our wonderful Deacon Marti Holmes? Another blessing to us! However, it all changes Father Blake's job somewhat. Along with being our spiritual, pastoral and



ministerial leader, he is also managing a team. He leads a staff that oversees different areas of parish ministry.

We don't want this to be a financial report. However, there are a few things we should address. As you can see in your weekly service programs, we are doing well with our Annual Response and we thank our very generous family for your continuing commitment. Your Vestry takes being excellent stewards of your gifts and our funds to heart. We have worked to clean the budget and streamline the process. We have a clearer vision of the cost of events and programs. We have implemented new processes for checks and balances on all our expenses. We are evaluating fundraising and how it impacts the Holy Apostles family. We have been incredibly blessed again with your gifts and ongoing commitment to Lighting the Way. Please remember that an updated copy of the budget is always posted with monthly minutes to the Vestry meeting (bulletin board next to Adult Formation room.) Our goal is to always be transparent and open for all your questions. We look forward to a very exciting and positive financial report at our October Annual Meeting. And, always feel free to ask your Vestry members any question you may have concerning our policies, budgets, and general church process. We are an extension of you.

We have worked through the survey, responded with a number of changes, and have come out as a stronger church family. Your Vestry and Rector made a commitment that it wouldn't be just verbiage. Father Blake has responded to the feelings, thoughts, and wants expressed. It's hard to be all things for all people, but he has really stepped up! One of the primary takeaways from the survey was a decision that we wouldn't worry so much about church growth. Father Blake's focus has consciously become more pastoral. Our growth has slowed somewhat but we are still gaining some wonderful new members in an organic way. How exciting is that?! Thank you to all of our staff and leadership – from committee members to teachers to volunteers. And, we are so very blessed to have Father Blake, Christina, and Wesley in our Holy Apostles family. Please know that we are here on your behalf—your Vestry, Clergy, and staff.

Thanks for your indulgence, but we want you have the updates you requested as time goes on. Thank you all for being a member of a wonderful church family.

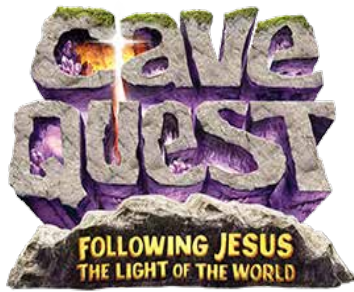
Thanks to everyone who has generously donated to the “Book & Snack Chips” drive for Sawyer ville Day Camp and the Yellowhammer Literacy Project.

HOLY APOSTLES FORE-G Golf Challenge

Gathering for golf, God and giving

FORE G Golf Tournament

The Holy Apostles FORE-G Golf Challenge will tee off Monday, Sept. 12th, at Inverness Golf and Country Club, one of the area's premier golf facilities. Proceeds from the tournament will go to support Holy Apostles ministries serving the community's children, elderly and the disabled.

The FORE-G is a play on "Gathering for Golf, God and Giving," tournament organizers said. Other Alabama Episcopal parishes are being challenged to enter teams but the event is open to the general public as well.

"This will be a great opportunity for golfers throughout the Diocese as well as the greater Birmingham area to experience an outstanding golf course and at the same time, do something for the community through the outreach programs at Holy Apostles," said Dee Nance, the tournament coordinator.

"I urge members of the Holy Apostles family to look for ways they can participate or contribute to the tournament," Nance said. "In addition to at least 80 golfers, we will need 30 hole sponsors, items for door prizes, prizes for longest drive, straightest drive, longest putt and closest to the pin."

Nance said the tournament organizers are also looking for items such as drink huggers, pens, golf balls, sunscreen or chap stick, hand sanitizers, small towels and snacks such as crackers or cookies to go into gift bags for the individual golfers.

"If your company or your employer would like to donate any of these items or be a sponsor, I would love to hear from you," Nance said. "There are several opportunities such as title sponsor, lunch sponsor, or breakfast sponsor as well as hole or tee sponsor, so this is a great opportunity to showcase your company and contribute to a great cause."

The entry fee will be \$125 per golfer or \$500 per foursome, which includes greens fee, cart, range balls, continental breakfast, lunch, two beverage tickets and prizes. Nance said the format will be straight score per foursome, with no handicap required. Mulligans will be two for \$20.

"We will need a number of volunteers from the church," Nance said, "specifically for the holes where there are prizes, on the holes where we have drink coolers and at the clubhouse to help with registration, mulligans, raffle tickets and to distribute drinks."

On Sunday June 12, parishioner Tony Kok will be recognized for completing the 4-year Education for Ministry seminar. Over four years, Tony committed to a in-depth study of Old and New Testaments, History of Christianity and Church History, and other faith traditions and faith communities. In addition, Tony developed the ability to reflect theologically on the issues of our current times. The practice of theological reflection requires a suspension of “what we know and what we believe to be true” to look at things through the powerful lenses of creation, sin, repentance, and redemption. It is an extraordinary accomplishment to complete this program and we congratulate Tony on his effort and commitment.



We are currently enrolling participants for the 2016 – 2017 EfM year. The seminar runs from late August to early June and meets weekly during that time. It is a four-year program, which participants commit to one year at a time. There are multiple focuses during the seminar depending on the students' current year of study. This creates a rich environment for deep learning and connection. The focus for each year is:

Year 1: Old Testament

Year 2: New Testament

Year 3: History of Christianity

Year 4: Theological Questions & Other Faith Traditions

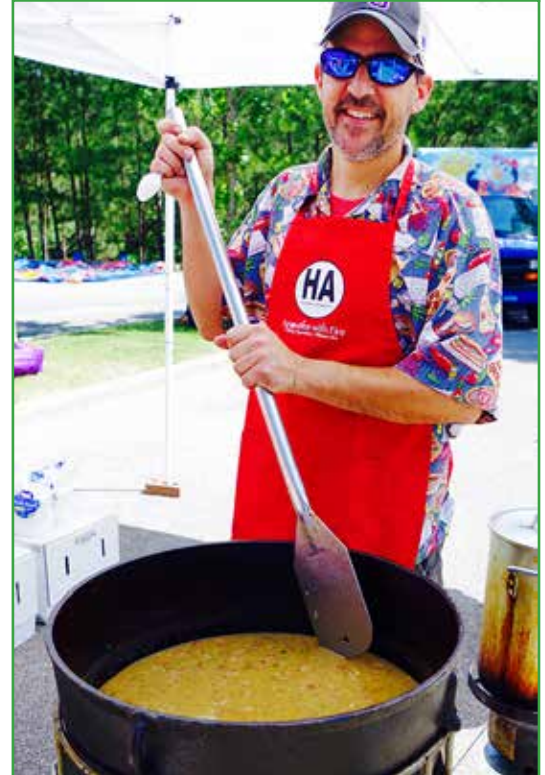
Apostles with Fire Cook Up Some Fun
