The Vestry kicked off the year in January with our Vestry Retreat. We enjoyed some fellowship and got a lot accomplished. Fortunately, we were able to pass a balanced, healthy budget for 2019. In the budget for 2019 we were able to include funding for a Curate for the 2nd half of 2019 with the intention of also being able to fund the Curate program into 2020. In the past the Diocese of Alabama has covered majority of the expenses for the Curate program. Beginning in 2019 we are required to cover 50% of the expenses for the Curate. Having the funds to be able to do so is a huge step towards our Parish goal of being able to fully fund an Associate Priest in the future. Thank you for your generosity and support of Holy Apostles that allows us to be able move forward in meeting these goals we all set together!

Another big goal the parish set during our Strategic Visioning in 2017 was opening a “parent’s day out” program of some sort. We all saw this program as an outreach opportunity in our community and a way to help us meet other goals by bringing in additional income. The Vestry has given the Strategic Visioning team the green light to begin very preliminary exploration on the possibility of opening an Infant Center at Holy Apostles. We have done the homework to determine this type of program is greatly needed in our area. We have also determined what equipment and staff would be needed. At this time, we’re in the very early stages of determining what costs we would incur in opening a program such as this as well as the liability. More updates on this coming soon!

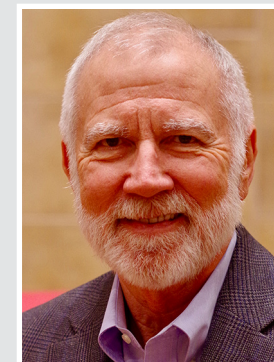

Jose Fernandez is an intern at Holy Apostles who is in the second year at the Alabama Integrative Ministry School (AIMS), our local diocesan seminary program training bi-vocational deacons and priests. The AIMS second year internship experience focuses on the development of the pastoral identity of their students, and there is no better place for that than at Holy Apostles!

Jose grew up in a small town in Puerto Rico and left there to teach (for six years) at South Bronx High School in 1988. While there, he earned his Master’s degree at Columbia University’s Teachers College. Moving on to Pennsylvania, he earned a PhD in Biobehavioral Health in 1999 at Penn State. But it was his subsequent training in the genetics of obesity that brought him to UAB’s Department of Nutrition Sciences in 2001. He is a professor and Vice-Chair for Education.

Jose’s religious background is unique — raised Catholic and influenced by his mother’s beliefs in Afro-Caribbean spirituality, he also attended a Baptist Church that “influenced my spirituality during my adolescence and young adulthood.” He became an

Episcopalian in 2001 “when a priest at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in NYC offered Kevin (who as a member of that congregation) to bless our relationship... it was the first same sex blessing in the history of that church. I did not understand why this priest was willing to do that, or why this was happening to me. During a conversation, the priest told me that God was reminding me of my identify as the son of The King that transformed my life and defined my own theology.”

During Education for Ministry (EfM) studies, Jose was called to the ministry. He graduated EfM in 2007, served as an active EfM mentor until 2018, and became a trainer of mentors in 2017. He maintains his status as a EfM Trainer by training at least three times per year.

“The community of Holy Apostles manifests the love of Christ through their gifts of inclusiveness, love, and hospitality. Walking into HA makes people feel at home; sharing the peace makes people feel loved and validated. It is a gift that this congregation shares with those who come through our doors, and that exemplifies our commitment to be servants of the Lord.”

Daughters of the King Update

Holy Apostles is home to one of the largest Daughters of The King (DOK) chapters in the Diocese.

The Spring Assembly Meeting of the Order of the Daughters of the King in the Diocese of Alabama was held on March 23, 2019 at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Birmingham. More than ninety women from throughout the Diocese were in attendance. The Reverend Mary Bea Sullivan presented the program that was based on her book *Living the Way of Love*. Bishop Kee Sloan was the celebrant for the Eucharist.

The Order of the Daughters of the King® is an order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it. After a period of instruction and discernment, a candidate may (or may not) choose to become a Daughter. When one becomes a Daughter, two rules are followed: the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service. A Daughter promises to support the clergy; wear the cross of The Order; and work for the purposes of The Order as opportunity offers. Dues are paid annually.

The Fall Assembly Meeting for the DOK in the Diocese of Alabama will be held on September 14, 2019, at Holy Apostles.

What is Stopping You?

I had returned to working in private practice — back where I began before I accepted a faculty position at a major university school of dentistry. After 2 years on the faculty, I was unsure whether this was the direction I wanted to take. After all, I would need at least one additional degree to continue in academics for the long haul. I needed some time to evaluate my options. School is costly — in time and money.

A young man came in for his regular appointment, and our conversation turned to his dreams for the future. He had graduated from college a year or so previously, and really wanted to go to law school. He was debating whether he should apply this year. I said to him, “If you really want to do it, then go ahead and apply. There is nothing stopping you.” He seemed uplifted, and when his treatment was completed, he went on his way.

As I prepared my instruments for sterilization, I looked at myself in the mirror above the sink, and repeated my own words to myself, “If you really want to do it, then go ahead and apply. There is nothing stopping you.” At that moment, I realized that only my fear and self-doubt were standing in my way, so I made my way to the phone. When the director of the graduate program answered, I asked whether I had time to apply for the coming year, and she said, “Marti, get your application in by Monday at noon, and I will have grant money for you for the program.” Just like that — no questions asked, no hoops to jump through — nothing stopping me but myself. Less than 2 months later, I was a full time graduate student with funding for school and living expenses. Wow! What a moment of grace! All that was required from me was to accept it!

The criminal on the cross next to Jesus just said, “Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom.” He had admitted to the other criminal his

reverence for God, that he deserved his punishment, and, that Jesus was an innocent man. He just wanted to be remembered by the man on that cross beside his.

But, Jesus replied to him, “Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise.” In this moment, he reveals to the criminal, by using the word “paradise”, that he truly is a King. And, a King that had the power to bring him to safety.

The criminal didn’t have to make a confession. There were no required classes for him to take. No special ceremony or rite. He did not have to promise to amend life — what was left of it. Nothing was required of him except to turn to this man, Jesus, and trust. In that very day, he would be liberated! Wow! What a moment — an eternity — of grace!

God offers this grace to every part of his creation continually, consistently, and without requiring anything from us. The wind blows where it blows. The rain falls on the good and the evil. Grace is everywhere — we just have to turn toward it, and recognize it for what it really is: the love that is God. This Easter Season, and at all times, may you see the grace that God pours upon you, and be grateful. Happy Easter!

A Musical Setting for Holy Eucharist

Rite II from the Book of Common Prayer has been set to contemporary music by local Birmingham composers, Jacqueline Dicie and Fred Pollman. Derek Kluz, the HA choir, and special guest musicians premiered the service March 3rd at Holy Apostles within the context of the hour-long service of Holy Eucharist. Both composers took part.

Rite II began with the ancient Kyrie Eleison, transitioning to a Gloria with a driving piano accompaniment in F major. A Gospel Alleluia sequence, reprising thematic elements of the Gloria followed, and a jazz-infused Sanctus and Mystery of Faith, with settings of Christ Has Died, the Great Amen, and Alleluia, Christ our Passover, concluded with a gentle, lyrical Lamb of God, reprising lyrical sentiments of the Kyrie.

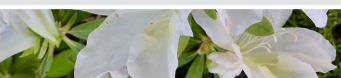
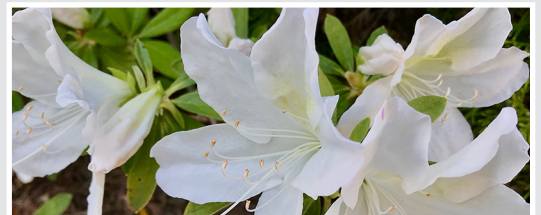
The clearly written but harmonically ambitious choral parts of the Mass of the Holy Apostles poses a level of challenge for an average choir in this diocese where the musical tradition is rich and choirs tend to be equipped with talented voices. A musical setting used every week must be sufficiently complex to maintain the interest of clergy, people, and choir over time. This setting would serve a congregation and choir well, especially in parishes offering afternoon contemporary services for devotees of the Cursillo movement.

The Mass of the Holy Apostles is offered as a gift to the Diocese, and choral copies of the music are offered to interested parishes through the Church of the Holy Apostles in Hoover. The conductor's full score and the piano/obligato score are available from the composers for a fee, which includes performance and photocopying rights for your parish for a period of five years. Information and support is available from Derek Kluz, Director of Music at Holy Apostles parish.

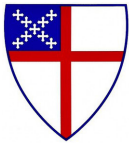
