### A Message From the Rev. Blake Hutson



#### Dear Apostles,

During his life, Jesus performed many miracles. These miracles not only teach us something about Jesus, but also something about ourselves and about how God works in the world.

One of my favorite miracle stories is 'the feeding of the five thousand.' The Gospel writers thought this story was so important that all four, Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, included this miracle in their Gospel.

The story goes like this: Crowds were following Jesus and as evening approached, everyone started to get hungry. Instead of sending them away to fend for themselves, Jesus had compassion on the people. The disciples brought to Jesus the food that they could find: five loaves of bread and two fish. Jesus took what they brought to him, blessed it, broke the food, and gave the food to the disciples. The disciples in turn gave it to the hungry people. All ate and were filled — five thousand men, plus women and children. In the end, the disciples picked up twelve baskets of leftovers.

So basically, the disciples saw there was a need. The disciples responded by bringing what they had to Jesus. Jesus blessed it. Then Jesus used it. There was so much food...there was an abundance!

Over the last month, with our Bridging the Gap effort, we saw this miracle in our church! There was a need and Holy Apostles responded. There was so much given...there was an abundance! We not only bridged the gap, but we also exceeded it!

The scriptures show us that God works through each one of us. We all have something valuable to contribute. ### Youth and Children's Ministries at Holy Apostles

The COVID-19 pandemic was especially challenging for youth and children's ministries at Holy Apostles. In 2020, when all or most of our ministries had to be scaled back or temporarily suspended, youth and children's ministries lacked even the online components that allowed the rest of the parish to gather virtually. And while we certainly were able to offer families a variety of materials that were designed to strengthen our children's relationship with God from home, we were limited in our ability to gather and form meaningful relationships as a parish family.

However, in the fall of 2021, we were finally able to begin offering more robust programming for our youth and children. We are offering in-person Sunday school for youth from age four through twelfth grades. We are fortunate to have a dedicated group of volunteers who teach the children's class on a monthly rotating basis. Our youth ministries have been reinvigorated by the dedicated ministry of Rosemary Bogan, who has faithfully offered Sunday school to our Jr. and Sr. high class, as well as EYC twice a month. We have also been able to offer regular fellowship events for our children due to the planning and support of Laura and Richard Eppes, along with innumerable and invaluable volunteers.

In the coming weeks, we have a several youth and children's offerings. On Palm Sunday, April 10th, the youth host a Palm Sunday Salad Bar fundraiser following the 10:30 a.m. service. We hope you will stay for lunch and support the EYC ministries at Holy Apostles. On Easter Sunday, a children's Easter Egg hunt for those in fifth grade and younger will follow the 10:30 a.m. service. And on May 1st, our annual Youth and Children's Sunday, in which youth will serve as worship leaders, is scheduled for the 10:30 a.m. service.

The Church is fond of saying that children are the future, but it is important to remember that children and youth are also the Church NOW. With your support and encouragement, Holy Apostles hopes to continue offering worship, fellowship, and outreach opportunities for the youth. Holy Apostles' 2022 Vestry started the New Year with three new members; a goal of keeping the Curate position; a proposed deficit budget; and the hope for returning to indoor services and saying good-bye to Covid.

As we begin April and continue the Lenten season, we here at Holy Apostles have so much to be grateful for. Here are some highlights of those blessings:

- Our new members, Kathy Whatley, Scott Dunbar, and Hillary Ginas are invaluable assets to the Vestry
- The Vestry agreed to fund the Curate position half-time as the Curate is a major contributor to the Clergy team
- A balanced budget was submitted to the Diocese by using funds from the checking account to cover the deficit
- Fr. Blake assembled the Bridging the Gap committee with José facilitating. The energy that was generated resonated with the membership and we as a church have exceeded the goal of \$34K
- Indoor services have resumed but we will keep an outdoor service the first Sunday in April, May, and June (weather permitting.)

I hope you have read the Happenings weekly addition of "Vestry Vibes." There are so many important functions and activities of the parish that make us the Parish we are ... that the Vestry wants to highlight these at least weekly.

#### A Report from Our Junior Warden

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### **Bridging the Gap**

Any theologians believe that what we know today as the 2nd letter of Paul to the Corinthians, was in fact a combination of more than one letter Paul wrote to the church he founded in Corinth. Paul was a believer that creating communities of faith to support the doctrines and ministries of Christ required the unity of Jews and Gentiles. With this in mind, Paul had agreed with Jewish Christians in Jerusalem to help the poor by collecting an offering from the churches he had founded in Greek territories. Chapter 8 and 9 of 2nd Corinthians describe Paul's position in fundraising. These chapters have been used as a framework for Christian understanding of stewardship.

Our "Bridging the Gap" initiative was based on Paul's framework. When Scott Dunbar, Diane Eggert, David Mize, Cathy Newhouse, Blake and I initiated a plan to invite the congregation to participate in this initiative, we had no idea of what to expect. We were humbled by the generosity of our fellow parishioners, and celebrated how every week, the numbers increased from approximately \$5K, to \$14K, to \$28K, to \$32K, to \$38K, to \$43K, to more than \$48K!!! Today we do not have a financial gap; in fact, we have additional funds to direct into our mission and outreach.



This initiative, however, was more than a financial strategy. I believe that 2nd Corinthians 9: 7, "God loves a cheerful giver", invites us to do more than just sharing our finances. Although I have understand

that keeping Holy Apostles and its ministries functioning requires monetary resources, it also requires the gifts of people. Being a cheerful leader also invites us to reflect upon our talents, our commitment, and our time. It invites us to step out of our comfort zone,

and extend the actions of our



Christian faith to others. It invites us to be committed with the orphan, the widow and the foreigner. It invites us to be aware of our actions, so we might act justly, love tenderly and always walk with our God. It invites us to stand firm, and to make no peace with oppression.

Responding to these invitations, as clearly stated by Paul, should never come from a place of coercion, reluctance, or compulsion. Paul invites us to give what we have decided in our hearts, as little or as much, according to our means. I think it is in that heart-searching, heart-filling, decision making, introspective process where God speaks to us, it is in that place of discovering what giving from our hearts mean where the spirituality of giving resides! The gift of giving to God is a product of our inner conversations with God, it is an expression of our own theology, and of our own relationship with our Creator. When we reach that place, we finally understand that "giving is a spiritual practice!"

On behalf of the clergy team and the members of the "Bridging the Gap" committee, I thank you for your gifts... all of them... and pray that you hear the calling of God to share those gifts with the world around you. After all, isn't that the way to practice building the Kingdom "on earth as it is in heaven?"

### A Call to Mission – Parting Words

n October 1st, 2011, as I was ordained to the diaconate, I left my "sending parish" of St. Stephen's to begin ministry at Grace, Woodlawn. I physically left the community of St. Stephen's, but I carried that community in my heart, and it is there, still today. When my ministry at Grace came to its close, I physically departed that community, but it took up residence in its special place in my heart as I then made my way to serve this wonderful community that is Holy Apostles. It has been my joy and privilege to live and work in this parish community for over seven years, serving God with you, and receiving your love and support. I will always give thanks to God for each of you, and you have been such a gift to me!

In the ordination of the deacon, it specifically says that a deacon serves "directly under the bishop" and that we are "to serve all people, particularly the poor, the weak, the sick, and the lonely." In a very real way, deacons are missionaries – we are always to be available to be sent – that is what mission means – to be sent. So, last summer, when All Saints in Montgomery suddenly found themselves without a priest, Bishop G asked if I would be willing to serve as supply clergy to lead worship until the end of December. This is not the usual work of a deacon, but when



there is a need, and the bishop makes the request, as a deacon you go where that need is, and I was most willing to go. I was assured that another deacon would share that assignment one Sunday each month. The other deacon was serving as supply clergy two Sundays each month at another parish, so we each would have three Sundays a month on duty as supply clergy.

As you are aware, our diocese has very limited resources of part-time, bi-vocational priests and deacons. Adding to that, during this same time, the other churches in the Montgomery area were seeking clergy to fill available slots, and so when December arrived, there were no available clergy to help supply at All Saints. The Bishop then asked me to take a longer, more formal appointment as Interim Deacon in Charge at All Saints to provide time for the parish and the diocese to find a way to meet their long-term clergy needs. With Holy Apostles well-staffed with clergy, my departure would not inhibit the ministry we shared, and there was a true need at All Saints. I am ordained to be a missionary to those in need; it is my call, and my heart was compelled to answer with a "yes".

Abraham answered a call to move. So did Moses, and Jacob, and Jesus, and Paul and all of the Apostles. Answering that call also means that we must learn to say goodbye to people we love and serve. I love you and miss you. I know that you will always be in my heart, and I hope that you find a place in your heart to hold me, too.

### **Lenten Reflections and Education for Ministry**

which Holy Apostles sends out daily during the 40 days of Lent (through email) are meaningful to you. Did you notice something similar in each day's thoughts? First, each reflection ends with a prayer, a collect, written by the author, and secondly, most of the authors are members of either the Tuesday Morning or Thursday Evening Education for Ministry (EfM) seminar!

If you haven't heard about EfM, you need to – participants in the EfM seminars find them to be spiritually lifechanging. Officially, EfM is described as "*small, mentored groups that provide the framework for understanding and shaping actions as Christian faith is deepened.*" Yes, that is true. But we also examine our own beliefs while examining the ordinary and the extraordinary. We read a lot, yes, but the real growth comes in challenging ourselves and each other to think deeper about what it means to be followers of Jesus.

Each week we lead each other in reflection on an experience or a written piece or a photo, or art or a newsclip or even a fishing rod! Inevitably, our discussions lead to important questions on our lives, our community, our faith, and our role in reflecting the face of God to others. Sound deep? Yes, it is. But we have laughs and relate to others in our seminar group in unbelievable ways.

This Lent, the EfM seminar groups decided to share some of our reflections with the Holy Apostles community. Each week, as a result of discussion in the seminar, we articulate "*I believe*" statements that, in turn, leads us to the composition of a group prayer or collect. As our gift to the Parish, we all decided to write reflections during Lent on the daily scripture readings and end it with a prayer – a collect developed by the day's author.

You can also write your own daily prayer! While it sounds intimidating, we use a simple formula:

Dear God ... Thank You for ... Help us (me) to ... So that we (I) may ... Amen

Fill in the blanks!

And think about joining EfM next fall. During the coming months, we will be advertising EfM and answering the questions you may have.

Dear God of all Knowledge, thank you for the opportunity to grow in faith through EfM and thank you for our wonderful mentors, Marti Holmes (Emerita), and José Fernández. Help me to spread the word about this wonderful learning opportunity, EfM, so that we may share it with even more of your Saints here on earth. Amen
